If Mrs. Williams were aware of the 1913 genealogy, she may not have included pending further proof.	2

He could have been the son of Solomon and Roxanna (Rider) Lewis. His presumed wife, however, was age 20 to 30 – a bit young to have been the daughter of Stephen Wicks/Weeks.	4
